



Music historian and writer Nicholas Jennings tells us about celebrations through the ages.

Celebrations come in many forms. In ancient Greece, well before the arrival of Christianity, music was central to the wild celebrations that pagans held to mark the changing seasons. The parties were so good that people clung on to them long after they became Christians. Christmas itself evolved out of the Roman Empire's Saturnalia festival of light that celebrated the longest night of the year. And both Christmas and Hanukkah have given rise to a tradition of warm, music-filled social gatherings that help us endure those long cold nights.

At Massey Hall and Roy Thomson Hall, these traditions continue through a variety of performances; from various interpretations of the Messiah to choral, classical and pop-based concerts (see pg. 10-12).

New Year traditions, meanwhile, date back thousands of years across cultures: the Babylonians celebrated with Il days of parades; the Romans partied, decorated their homes and made sacrifices to Janus, the month's namesake. Medieval Europe, though, cancelled the paganistic celebrations, but once New Year's action was restored, associated rituals tended to employ as much noise as possible to ward off evil. Rather than with noise,

Massey Hall and Roy Thomson Hall opt for equal amounts of comedy and tragedy to celebrate the coming year: Roy Thomson Hall ends the year on a dramatic note with the annual Bravissimo! opera gala (see pg. 13), while Massey Hall celebrates the coming year with the 15th annual New Year's Eve Comedy Extravaganza (see pg. 14).

When it comes to celebrations, Carnival is the biggest party of them all. It began as a Roman Catholic pre-Lent celebration known as Carne Vale, literally meaning "no meat," and was later transported to the New World by European colonizers and slave traders. At first, the African slaves were excluded from the festivities. But after emancipation, the freed slaves transformed what had been demure masquerade balls into the raucous street parades full of brightly-colored costumes and rhythmically-lively sounds that characterize Carnival today. What was once a sedate European festival became a not-to-be-missed event across the Americas that gave everyone a chance to forget life's troubles. This year, Massey Hall celebrates these global traditions with a series of Carnivalian events (see pg. 16), including globalFEST's Creole Carnival. Forgetting your troubles never sounded so good.

Jazz at Massey Hall: On and for the Record

Writer and critic J.D. Considine discusses the ongoing history and evolution of Jazz at Massey Hall

"Jazz at Massey Hall" has long meant something special. Jazz fans know it as the title of a legendary bebop album. But it has since become an imprimatur that suggests a mastery of the tradition shot through with youthful bravado.

In that sense, this season's offerings are classic examples of JaMH mystique. Singer Emilie-Claire Barlow is a jazz musician who is as at home with swing-era standards as post-Beatles pop. She won a JUNO Award in 2012 for Seule ce Soir, and just released Clear Day, recorded with the famed Metropole Orkest.

Canadian guitarist Benoît Charest's score to The Triplets of Belleville is a tour de force evoking everything from Django Reinhardt to the Andrews Sisters to composer Harry Partch. Because there's

virtually no dialogue, everything in the film is told through sound and image. Charest's band will perform the score live to the film, complete with sound effects - a Massey Hall first.

Pianist Michael Kaeshammer's bold take on boogie and blues has its roots in the 78s his father collected, although he's since broadened his repertoire to include bits of gospel, New Orleans funk and even rock. That approach crystalized with his 2011 album, Kaeshammer, but he still loves to boogie, as his virtuosic solo album, The Pianist, makes clear.

The SFJAZZ Collective, a conglomeration of young Bay-Area jazz aces whose co-founders included both "young lion" saxophonist Joshua Redman and old-guard vibraphonist Bobby Hutcherson, pay tribute to a different genius each year. Last year, it was saxophonist Joe Henderson; this year, it's Michael Jackson. A stretch? Or, perhaps, just the sort of perspective shifting brilliance we expect from Jazz at Massey Hall.
